First aid for asthma

Condition in which the air passages in the lungs constrict (figure 7.2) and interfere with normal breathing.

Causes

- Allergic reaction to dust, molds, pet dander, or other substances
- Exposure to cold environments such as ice-skating rinks
- Exposure to smoke or other inhaled substances
- Adverse response to strenuous exercise

Ask if players are experiencing...

- Tightness in the chest
- Shortness of breath


Check for signs...

- Trouble exhaling
- Wheezing noises when breathing
- Increased respiratory rate (normally 12-20 breaths per minute at rest)
- Fingernails, lips, or skin may turn blue or gray
- Pulse rate may increase to 120 beats per minute or more
- Athlete is noticeably frightened



If the athlete has an asthma inhaler or medicine, do the following:

- 1. Send someone to retrieve the athlete's inhaler or medicine and have the athlete use the medicine when it arrives.
- 2. If necessary, you may assist the athlete in using the inhaler or taking the medicine.*
- 3. Monitor breathing and provide CPR if needed (if either is needed, send for emergency medical assistance).
- 4. Monitor the athlete's skin and lip color. If either changes to blue or gray, send for emergency medical assistance.
- 5. Call for emergency medical assistance if the athlete shows no signs of improvement a few minutes after administering the medication.
- 6. If the athlete recovers within a few minutes, call the athlete's parents or guardian to take the athlete to a physician.



If asthma medicine is not available or the athlete does not respond to medication, do the following:

- 1. Send for emergency medical assistance.
- 2. Monitor breathing and provide CPR if needed.
- 3. Place the athlete in a seated or semi-reclining position.
- 4. Monitor and treat for shock as needed.
- 5. Reassure the athlete.

*Administer an Epi-pen when a victim is unable to do so only if you have been trained to use it properly, the medication has been prescribed by a physician, and such administration is allowed by law.
